

The Amador Central Railroad™ Management Committee (AMCMC) sponsored a County Fair booth promoting the Amador Central Railroad™ (AMCRR), owned by the Amador County Historical Society and the Recreational Railroad Coalition Historical Society (RRCHS). An informative display of the history of the railroad was complimented by three Maintenance of Way vehicles. This was the AMCRR's first fair exhibit and thanks go to Deborah Cook who spearheaded this effort, with help from ACHS and RRCHS members. Thank you, Deborah, and all the volunteers that talked with visitors at the booth!

The weather was clear dry and beautiful for the 6 maintenance cars and the volunteer crew that cleaned tracks, and trimmed trees and bushes. Inspections and Function tests for the crossing gates and signals were performed to ensure the safe operations at the Highway crossings. The historic Amador Central Railway was constructed in 1904 and snakes 12.5 miles through the hills between Martell and Ione.

END OF THE LINE!

The Martell Amador Central Railroad Depot in Martell is being torn down. Currently under ownership of Sierra Pacific Industries (SPI), The demolition began this morning with five workers. The dis-assembly of the building is being done so as to salvage as much lumber from the building as possible. The warehouse portion of the Depot came down first.

Built in 1905 and operated under the Eastern & Ione RR, Amador Central RR and the Foothill RR until about 2002, the building has been falling into disrepair. Once a predominant structure in Martell, It served freight and Passenger line service from the Jackson and Sutter Creek areas to the Ione Depot where passengers and freight were linked to the Central Pacific, Southern Pacific, and later the Union Pacific railways for destinations further down the line.

It was through this station rescue teams from the east side of the Rockies traveled in a heroic attempt to save the 47 miners trapped in the Argonaut Mine disaster. The Amador Central Depot will be remembered for it's



historical link from our Foothill homes and lumber mills to the Cities to the west.

The historic Amador Central Rail line still exists between State Highway 88 at Ridge Road Near Martell to the lone Depot. The line is owned and maintained by a partnership of the Amador County Historical Society and the Recreational Railroad Coalition and Historical Society.

The lone Depot is currently being rescued from demolition in lone under the efforts of the City of lone and the Amador County

MIDDLEBAR BRIDGE

Originally built in 1912, the historic Middle Bar Bridge is a simply supported, steel-truss bridge that spans the Mokelumne River and links Calaveras and Amador counties. At 2041 long and 221 wide,



the Pratt Truss bridge links Gwin Mine Road in Calaveras County and Middle Bar Road in Amador County. The bridge¹s steel was originally fabricated in 1901. First made of timber, the bridge�s deck was replaced in 1969 with corrugated metal planking filled with bituminous pavement.

The 1912 Middle Bar Bridge is the third bridge built on this site crossing the Mokelumne River, near Jackson and the historic Gold Rush community of Middle Bar. It is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The steel truss bridge was restored in 1999 and is open to vehicle and pedestrian traffic. It's a popular spot for fishing.

AMADOR CENTRAL RAILROAD



On July 20th there was a workday on the Amador Central Railway. Members of the Amador County Historical Society and the Recreational Railroad Coalition and Historical Society Teamed up and performed maintenance to keep the railway Function ready.
