Our speaker, Frank Tortorich Jr., will give an appropriate for the occasion talk on the Bear Flag Revolt of 1846, or as he calls it, "A Silly Little War." Amador City's 1939 Dodge Fire Truck by Ed Arata

In the 1920s and 30s across the United States, many small communities built their own fire trucks as motor driven vehicles become more widely used and available. Sutter Creek lead the way in Amador County with the creation of their first fire truck using an early Dodge Brothers 1920s light truck known as a screen side commercial car. The Sutter Creek Fire District had purchased a 40-gallon chemical cart fire extinguisher in 1910 that was mounted on cartwheels and pulled by





manpower. The chemical extinguisher with hose basket was mounted on the Dodge along with a hose reel for 2-inch cotton hose, a ladder and other fire fighting tools. The truck is shown here on Eureka Street in the 1920's. The only known person in this photo is Fire Chief, J.J. Capetanich, seated center in the truck.

Sutter Creek followed up on this early Dodge with a 1934 Dodge that they purchased new and then the fire body was added at Oneto Brothers Garage under the direction of O. Shirley Clements. That Dodge (shown on the next page) is in front of the original Cap's Garage on Eureka Street. Chief Capetanich is standing at the front of the truck. This truck was sold or given to Fiddletown in the late 50's and is still there today.

In 1939 a need for Amador City to acquire a fire truck was expressed during joint meeting of the Amador City fire commissioners and the city

board of councilmen. This was captured in the Amador Ledger of April 27, 1939:

Amador Ledger - April 27, 1939

The Amador City fire commissioners and the city board of councilmen held a joint meeting in the city hall Tuesday evening in regard to purchasing a fire truck. Summer time is near and there is more apt to be fires than any other time of the year, so if they did decide upon a new fire truck, we think it would be grand! This spring, the city councilmen cut just grass that was necessary so they could put the grass-cutting money toward a new truck, so many property owners are trying to get the grass away from their property along the streets at their own expense.

The fire truck was ordered from Sutter Creek and delivered in

October 1939 as again documented in the Amador Ledger of October 9, 1939.

This fire truck still exists today with about 1100 original miles on the odometer. It will soon be housed in the old Amador City fire house which is being developed as a small fire museum by the City of Amador City and the Sutter Creek Fire District and Fire Department which has an ongoing fire history program. The 1939 Dodge is in good running condition and can be used in parades and community events.

Amador City Acquires New Fire Engine

Through the efforts and perseverance of its commissioners and city council, Amador City now owns an up-to-date piece of fire fighting equipment. The new equipment is a modern fire truck, built on one and a half ton Dodge chassis, has a two hundred gallon water tank pumped by a direct drive Barton G450 pump, mounted on the front of the car. The tank's capacity is sufficient to operate the pump for fifteen minutes at ninety pounds pressure without refilling.

The truck is equipped with a 16foot suction hose a 250 foot Booster hose and a 12-foot hook-ladder and one 12-foot extension ladder.

The apparatus was designed by Shirley Clements and built by Oneto Brothers, all of Sutter Creek, from specifications furinshed by fire commissioners and council men Faust Campini, Wm. Arditto, R. C. Merwin, James Tibbetts, Walter Miller, and Frank Kelly, all of Amador City, who raised the required \$2000 for building.

Railroad and Rail Fair - 2015

The Preston people were there as was the lone Fire Department, Ed Arata and the 1939 Dodge Amador City Fire Truck, Debbie Cook and her books combined with the ACHS, a free kids painting lesson by our own Pam Sharp, tractors, some old steam driven toys, my 1929 Sheffield Motorcar that used to ply the rails here, and a lot of good hardworking always smiling faces. All of this combined to set the stage for a fun weekend on the rails. There were 3 photographers there to record the event. 
