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### Summers in Amador County

As I think about the heat index outside and this edition of the Amadorian, I reflect back with a smile on my Summer's growing up in Jackson. As a youngster, we carpooled with neighbors (mom didn't drive) to Detert Park where activities at the Scout Hut filled our time before swimming lessons. We'd return home for lunch and couldn't wait to get back for the afternoon general swim with friends. Sunday family picnics at Detert Park were a regular occurrence for my mother's side of the family that included my aunt Sis (Campbell) and my many cousins. We would swim, play games, enjoy BBQ chicken and chili beans.

Every year we would have an opportunity to get away from the heat, traveling up Hwy 88, passing landmarks like "pancake rock" and "maiden's grave" knowing that we were getting close to our neighbors, Frances and George Milardovich's cabin, at Plasse's Resort. We would have a week of exploring on our bikes (we all fought to ride "Big Red"); fishing on "chesterfield rock" and swimming off of "Gilligand's Island". This cabin was very simple, no frills, but rich with memories.

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#### **Summers in Amador County (cont.)**

ACHS board member Ed Arata shared some antedotic thoughts and pictures (see below) about his family's summer's up Hwy 88 just past Plasse's Resort. In the 30s, Ed's dad and George Sausmon used to drag an old trailer, tents, etc. up to Silver Lake, just before you got to Kay's Resort and set up a Summer camp for his mom and sister, Aldren; and George's wife, Mary, and his daughter, Susie. Like many working husbands, Ed's dad and George would spend the weekdays in Jackson and then go up to Silver Lake on the weekends. Ed's mother used to say, "we were up there living like the Indians".


Recently, ACHS member Beverly Smallfield was chatting with Phil Giurlani and they got to talking about the history of Kay's Resort. Most of you know that it was recently demolished and now is a simple parking lot and boat ramp.

When William Brewer, member of the state's geological survey team, ambled by in 1863, "a large log house was going up at Silver Lake. While Brewer didn't specify others along the route, he observed "log houses going up al along the road." The revenuers in '64 saw a completed building - a stenograph of that original 2-story, log store and inn is part of the Amador collection. They called it "Wade's Lake House" and reported that Silver Lake was "Amador's pet lake". It was still Wade's in 1866, and later became Fagans and then Caminetti's until some time in modern times, Kay's Resort replaced it." Rose Kay is reported to have developed a resort there in the 1920's; the business was carried on by Dan Derrick and later by John White.\* The lease for Kay's Resort was given up by Mona White in 2006. Her husband John passed away in 1995 and she continued the business until that date. For a look at a nice memorial of Kay's Resort, check the U-tube video here.

It has been suggested that the Amador County Historical Society consider a historical landmark commemorating the many years of Kay's Resort. More on this project as it develops. I hope you have had an enjoyable summer here in Amador County or elsewhere!

#### President's Corner (cont).



# Banished & Embraced: The Chinese in Fiddletown and the Mother Lode

The book presents the experience of Chinese immigrants during and after the Gold Rush. Chinese from southeast China flocked to towns and encampments in the Sierra Nevada foothills to search for gold. In the communities they established in Fiddletown and Amador County, Chinese immigrants found support and strength despite prevailing anti-Chinese prejudice. This book gives an insight into their experience as they faced pressures from the greater society, while maintaining their customs and connections with each other and with China. The story of the Fiddletown Chinese community is told through the lives of the people who lived in its still existing Chinese herb store (the Chew Kee Store), especially Jimmie Chow, the last Chinese person in Fiddletown.

As you read the many accomplishments listed in the resolution, you'll recognize the value of their many contributions to the ACHS. *Thank you very* 

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani did collaborate with Larry Cenotto to present a work plan to rehabilitate the Brown House, known as the Amador County Museum, to minimum earthquake standards, to the Amador County Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani served as President of the Society in 2013 and 2014; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani did, along with the Giurlani Bunch perform the necessary rehabilitation for free during their infrequent spare moments; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani did along with the Giurlani Bunch and friends participate in cleaning, repairing, and organizing the exhibits and painting the entire inside and out of the Brown House; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani did repair or cause to be repaired at minimal cost to the Society the museum sewer lines; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani and friends did design and construct from the bare ground up a new ADA compliant bathroom in a former storage shed, including new plumbing, water lines, hot water heater, heating and lights: and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani and the Giurlani Bunch and friends made a useable office from a once artifact filled, and un-insulated and drafty room in the Cottage; and

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani and the Giurlani Bunch have gently persuaded members of the community to volunteer their time and labor to sheetrocking, plumbing, sewer cleaning, concrete work, ADA work, painting, etc.

WHEREAS Phillip Giurlani and the Giurlani Bunch have generously donated the cost of several Annual Dinners and other smaller events to the Society, in addition to providing rent free space for these events, thus allowing for the Society to receive 100% of the income for their treasury.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of the Amador County Historical Society, that a special resolution be adopted in recognition of the contributions provided by the Giurlani Family.

ACHS member, Fourth Generation Californian and Jackson native, Frank Tortorich, Jr., is playing a large role in the 33<sup>rd</sup> Annual National Convention for the Oregon-California Trails Association (OCTA). It is being held September 21-25, 2015, at Harveys, Stateline, Nevada.

You do not have to be a member of OCTA to register for the convention. The public is most welcome.

This year's theme is A Bonanza of Trails - The California Emigrant Trail and Cutoffs. There are 2- & 4-wheel drive preconvention tours and hikes; all-day bus tours to Donner Memorial State Park - Truckee River Route, to Carson River Route - Johnson Cutoff Loop (Frank Tetrarch is guide on one bus), and third choice to Coloma, the gold discovery town – Placerville with its El Dorado County Historical Museum; Hike both the Hawley Grade/Luther Pass trails.

Other activities include presentations on fur traders, pioneer women, the Carson River Route (Frank Tortorich), J. Goldsborough Bruff, Sutter's Fort, Nisenan Indians, Donner-Reed Wagon Party, and the history of people and places on and along the California Trail and its opening and its cutoffs. Add to all that, workshops, special events, book venders, Authors' Night, exhibits and more.


